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## **OUR MISSION**


## OUR MISSION IS SIMPLE AND FOCUSED: TO HELP EDUCATE THE CHILDREN OF NOMADIC FAMILIES IN NORTHEASTERN SAMBURU

Sereolipi Nomadic Education Foundation, Inc. was started in 2002 as The Thorn Tree Project. It was incorporated as a 501(c)3 non-profit organization in 2006. Our organization is based on a commitment to being goal-oriented, accountable, and highly effective. We establish clear objectives, put measurements in place to monitor them, and take corrective action immediately to ensure we always remain on track.

Our mission comes from the Samburu people themselves. It is a privilege to be invited into the Samburu tribe, and we make sure that everything we do is in tune with their culture and aligned with their goals. We aim to have the smallest possible footprint in Samburu, maintaining our focus on education.

Our final goal is to enable the Samburu to be self-sufficient – i.e. those educated through the Thorn Tree Project, with jobs outside of the traditional herding, will be able to give back to the community by supporting their younger siblings in getting proper education. As the family and community ties among the Samburu are very strong, this is a realistic expectation. Also, having jobs outside ofthe traditional herding will lessen their dependency on climate and the devastating droughts, which in turn will benefit the environment and the peace in the area.

## 2021 HIGHLIGHTS

#### GOFUNDME CAMPAIGN FOR WATER

We managed our first highly successful GoFundMe campaign, as well as established a new partnership with The Samburu Project. Together we drilled a new borehole, solar pump and 2.5-mile pipeline to provide clean drinking water to Lerata Primary School.

### **NOMADIC PRESCHOOLS**

Early childhood education lays the foundation for health, behavior, and learning for years to come. Far too many children start school already behind their peers making it so much harder for them to catch up and keep up.

#### YOUR SUPPORT COUNTS

In 2021 we spent about \$173,000 on our preschool and elementary school programs.

For each elementary school classroom we try to find an individual sponsor. The classes that do not have individual sponsors are supported through general donations and fund raisers.

In 2021, we had 9 individual sponsors who contributed a total of \$63,000.

In 2021 SENEF operated II preschools, with a total of 316 (January through July) and 351 (August through December) students, in the communities of Nesesiai, Nkusosroni, Kimaning, Nkii, Meuwa, Ilakweny(NDW), Sarara, Leitemu, Lekiji, Sera Rongai and Lentasim (SLP). These preschools feed into Ndonyo Wasin and Sereolipi elementary schools.

Ten of the preschools had individual sponsors, each of them contributing \$1,000. This donation covers teaching materials, salaries for an ECD teacher and a cook. All preschool children are given free lunch, which is sprovided by the government or by SENEF.

In August of 2021, twenty nine students who graduated from our preschools joined grades I in the elementary schools of Sereolipi and Ndonyo Wasin.





### **ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS**

#### **2021 SCHOOL CALENDAR**

The 9-months long disruption of the education in 2020 had a large impact on the school calendar in Kenya. In Kenya the academic year for elementary and secondary schools normally runs from January through mid November and is divided in three terms.

In order to make up for the time lost in 2020 the government made adjustments to the academic calendar and in 2021 the academic year had four instead of usual three terms. The academic year that started in January of 2020 ended on July 16, 2021. The following academic year started on July 26, 2021, with the third term scheduled for 2022.



#### YOUR SUPPORT COUNTS

In 2021 here was a total of 1,133 (January through July) and 1,176 (August through December) students enrolled in three elementary schools in the villages of Ndonyo Wasin, Sereolipi and Learata.

All of these students get their school uniforms through SENEF, as many would not be able to attend school just because of the price of the uniform. Almost half of the primary school students are boarders, with the largest number of boarders being in the village of Ndonyo Wasin, where about 80% of the students come from nomadic families. The government is obliged to supply school lunches for all of the students, while SENEF provides breakfast and dinner for all of its boarders as well as for the students living far from the school. In 2021 we spent a total of about \$56,000 on food only.

#### YOUR SUPPORT PROVIDED

The Kenyan Government does not supply adequate number of teachers (only I per 50 students). Therefore, in order to provide quality education to our youth, SENEF engaged I8 additional teachers in 2021.

All SENEF teachers are required to teach minimum of 20 hours a week and to devote an additional I.5 hour every afternoon to our library reading program. The library reading program, which consists of additional reading, writing and comprehension work for each student six days a week, takes place in one of the three libraries that were built by SENEF.

# SCHOLARSHIPS FOR FURTHER EDUCATION

The Samburu Scholarship program began in 2008 to help "first in family to ever attend school" students continue their journey through education.

In 2021, there were 86 high school scholarship recipients. Every year grade eight students in Kenya sit for a standardized test known as the Kenya Certificate of Elementary Education (KCPE). In order to qualify for the SENEF scholarship program the student must fulfill the following criteria:

- Attend one of the Thorn Tree Project's preschools
- Attend one of the three Thorn Tree Project sponsored elementary schools
- Score 300 or more on KCPE

86 high school scholarship recipients; 47 college or university scholarship recipients

36 elementary school students awarded full scholarships, with 2 students obtaining Mpesa Academy scholarships

13 enrolled in college12 graduated from college

We are incredibly grateful to our high school and college student sponsors, without whose generosity most of these students would not be able to get access to higher education.

#### YOUR SUPPORT COUNTS


21 students from the three elementary schools qualified for the SENEF high school scholarship program. Their KCPE scores ranged from 302 to 438.

With the help of one of our recent college graduates, Simon Lesamaja, an intern, we started an initiative to assist all of our elementary school graduates to apply for the outside scholarships. The scholarship applicants were able to obtain assistance and Simon was able to add this internship to his CV. Two of our high scoring students were successful in obtaining the Mpesa academy scholarships.

13 SENEF high school scholarship recipients who scored above C on their 2020/21 KCSE tests, five girls and seven boys, were all able to continue their education by receiving SENET scholarships.

#### THE RESULTS

The 2021 KCPE (Kenya Certificate for Primary Education) results were impressive. Out of 122 SENEF students who sat for the exam:

36 scored above 300 8 scored above 350 1 scored a top score of 372

The average score across Kenya is 250 out of a possible 500.

The 2021 KCSE (Kenya Certificate for Secondary Education) results were impressive. Out of 14 SENEF students who sat for the exam:

13 scored a C or above





## GIRL POWER PROGRAM

#### **GIRL RISING**

In February 2020, The Thorn Tree Project began a partnership with Girl Rising. Girl Rising is a non-profit organization whose mission is: To ensure that girls around the world are educated and empowered. When every girl is free to reach her full potential, our work will be done. Girl Rising uses story telling as a catalyst for impact and long-term social change, via film, television, social media videos, and more. It is through their powerful films about young girls around the world, that they've developed a curriculum for us to share with our girls and boys.

In 2021, we actively engaged our girls and boys in this new curriculum. Our hope is that through this additional exposure, it will allow both our girls and boys to increase their awareness and power to control their own lives and circumstances. Helping to prepare them for their future success!

### 2021 PROJECTS



#### **LERATA WATER**

Our special project in 2021 was the construction of the water supply for Lerata Elementary school. Lerata is situated in an extremely dry area, hardly suitable for neither people nor livestock.



The water has been a major problem for years. The original borehole went dry and we were forced to truck in the water. Fortunately, in partnership with The Samburu Water Project, we were able to construct a new borehole for the school.



Then through our successful GoFundMe Campaign, TTP managed to provide a solar-powered pump, a 2.5-mile piping and a water tower with a 10,000-liter capacity tank. Finally, our students in Lerata have a reliable source of clean drinking water!
